As of January 1, 2008, the geographical scope of the of international design registration

system (also known as the Hague System) will be broadened, due to the accession of the

European Community as one bloc, to the Geneva Act of the Hague Convention. From the

beginning of 2008 therefore, simply with the filing of a single application, end users will

have the ability to simultaneously opt for protection in all member-states of the

International design registration system, as well as the 27 member states of the European

Union (Community Design System).

With the inclusion of the European Community, which is the first inter-governmental

organization to accede to the Hague System, the official total member states of the latter

rises to 47 (although there is some overlap between EC members and previous Hague

System members). The International design registrations' system will thus become much

more attractive, convenient and cost effective to users.

Equally, it is expected that the creation of such an interface between the Community and

the International design registration system will prove to be an affordable, convenient and

efficient manner of handling industrial design registrations on a global level for the users

of the Community Design System as well. Notably, in August 2007, the total number of

registered and published Community designs exceeded 267.000 while the total number of

international designs contained in the registered deposits, from 1928 until 2006, was close

to 2 million.

The European Community's accession to International Design Registration system (based

on the Geneva Act of the Hague Convention) follows the successful accession of the EC to

the Madrid Protocol, for the International Trademark Registration system, in 2004.

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
